However, post-Vedic texts like the Manusmriti imposed stricter norms, emphasizing women's subordination. Modern Hindu reform movements have challenged these traditional restrictions, advocating for women's education and rights.

Buddhism: Early Buddhist teachings supported gender equality, allowing for the ordination of women (bhikkhunis). Over time, various Buddhist traditions imposed limitations on nuns, subordinating them to monks. Recent efforts aim to revive the bhikkhuni ordination and promote gender equality within Buddhist communities.

Judaism: In the biblical period, women held significant religious and social roles. Rabbinic Judaism, however, reinforced patriarchal structures through interpretations of the Torah and Talmud. Modern movements within Judaism, particularly Reform and Conservative branches, have embraced gender equality, promoting women's ordination and leadership roles.

4.2 Data from Interviews

Interview Participants

Participants were selected through a combination of purposive and snowball sampling to ensure a diverse representation of experiences. The sample included women from different age groups, educational backgrounds, and levels of religious observance. The primary focus was on their experiences and perceptions regarding the influence of their religious beliefs and practices on their status as women.

Key Themes from Interviews

Christianity: Interviewees from Christian backgrounds highlighted both progress and ongoing challenges in gender equality. Sarah, a 34-year-old pastor from a Protestant denomination, emphasized the strides made in her community, noting that women are now more accepted in leadership roles. However, she also mentioned encountering resistance from older, more conservative members who prefer traditional gender roles. In contrast, Mary, a 50-year-old member of a conservative evangelical church, reported significant limitations on women's roles, with leadership positions largely inaccessible to women.

Islam: Muslim women shared varied experiences reflecting the diversity within the Islamic world. Aisha, a 28-year-old lawyer from a progressive Muslim community in the United States, spoke about the positive influence of Islamic feminism in advocating for women's rights within a religious framework. She noted that her community supports women's education and professional development. Conversely, Fatima, a 42-year-old homemaker from a more traditional Muslim society, described facing restrictions on her mobility and participation in public life, largely due to conservative interpretations of Sharia law.

Hinduism: Hindu women discussed the impact of regional and cultural variations on their status.

Priya, a 30-year-old engineer from an urban area, highlighted the positive changes brought about by modern reform movements, such as increased access to education and career opportunities for women. However, Meera, a 55-year-old woman from a rural village, described enduring traditional expectations that prioritize women's roles as wives and mothers, with limited opportunities for personal or professional growth.

Buddhism: Buddhist women focused on the challenges and progress in monastic life. Tenzin, a 45-year-old bhikkhuni from Thailand, shared her experiences of advocating for the revival of the bhikkhuni ordination, which has faced significant institutional resistance. She noted that despite these challenges, there has been gradual progress, with more women now being ordained. In contrast, Ananda, a 38-year-old laywoman from Sri Lanka, described a more supportive environment where women actively participate in religious activities and are respected within their communities.

Judaism: Jewish women from different branches of Judaism shared their experiences. Rachel, a 29-year-old rabbi from the Reform movement, spoke about the inclusive practices in her community, where women are encouraged to take on leadership roles and participate fully in religious rituals. On the other hand, Leah, a 47-year-old Orthodox woman, described the traditional gender roles that limit women's participation in religious services and leadership, though she noted some gradual changes towards greater inclusivity.

4.3 Data Analysis

Thematic analysis of interview data identified several recurring themes across all religions:

1. **Progress and Resistance:** While there has been significant progress towards gender equality in many religious communities, resistance to change remains a common theme, particularly in more conservative branches.

3. **Enhance Women's Participation:** Religious institutions should create more opportunities for women to participate in leadership roles and religious activities. 4. **Promote Intersectional Approaches:** Understanding the intersectionality of women's experiences in religious contexts is crucial. Policies and initiatives should be tailored to address the specific needs and challenges faced by women from diverse backgrounds, taking into account
